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CAREERS IN PLANNING: How to Get Started

There are many different educational paths that can lead to a career in planning – ask a planner how they got into the field and each story will be as varied as the profession itself! Yet, some paths are more direct than others.

In Canada, accredited planning degrees are those recognized by the Provincial and Territorial Institutes and Associations (PTIAs), who regulate the profession, and which include many of

Certified Planning Technicians

In Canada, there are six college programs that qualify graduates to become Certified Planning Technicians. Planning technicians often have training in design, GIS, drafting, and land use planning, and often work directly with professional planners. Find out more about the profession from the Canadian Association of Certified Planning Technicians (CACPT).

the schools listed in this resource, as well as accredited planning programs in the United States and Australia. Accredited planning programs are offered at both the undergraduate and graduate level, and once complete, can help to fast-track an individual into the ‘candidate’ stage of the profession. Without an accredited degree, additional relevant work experience in the planning profession is required before an individual can qualify as a Candidate.

So, how do you choose a school?

Taking the step to apply to planning school is big and ultimately, it has to be the right fit. While there is a foundational curriculum offered, all schools have unique courses and learning opportunities, such as co-op placements and options relating to the programs’ instructional language (French and English). Accredited planning programs are also only delivered in person; therefore, you’ll need to consider location in making your choice. If you can, we recommend that you visit the campus, talk to current students, and speak to the graduates of the programs you’re interested in.

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Previous Learning Assessment Recognition (PLAR)

Previous Learning Assessment Recognition, or ‘PLAR’ as it’s more familiarly known, is the certification path taken for planners who hold any academic degree other than a recognized accredited planning university degree. For residents of most provinces and territories in Canada, the specific requirements include being employed in planning, having relevant planning work experience for at least five years, and holding a four-year degree. 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CARRIÈRES DANS LE DOMAINE DE L'URBANISME : comment démarrer sa carrière

Il existe de nombreux parcours de formation qui peuvent mener à une carrière dans l'urbanisme; demandez à un urbaniste comment il est entré dans le métier et il vous racontera des histoires aussi variées que la profession elle-même! Cependant, certaines voies sont plus directes que d'autres.

Au Canada, les diplômés d'urbanisme agréés sont ceux qui sont reconnus par les instituts et associations provinciaux et territoriaux (IAPT), qui réglementent la profession, et qui comprennent de nombreuses écoles énumérées dans ce document, ainsi que des programmes d'urbanisme agréés aux États-Unis et en Australie. Les programmes d'urbanisme agréés sont proposés au niveau du baccalauréat et de la maîtrise et,

Techniciens en urbanisme agréés :

Techniciens en urbanisme agréés : au Canada, il existe six programmes collégiaux qui permettent aux diplômés de devenir des techniciens en urbanisme agréés. Les techniciens en urbanisme sont souvent formés à la conception, aux SIG, à la rédaction et à l'aménagement du territoire, et travaillent souvent directement avec des urbanistes professionnels. Reconnaissance des acquis (RDA)

La reconnaissance des acquis ou « RDA » comme on l'appelle plus familièrement, est la voie de certification empruntée par les urbanistes titulaires d'un diplôme académique autre qu'un diplôme universitaire d'urbanisme reconnu et accrédité. Pour les résidents de la plupart des provinces et territoires du Canada, les exigences spécifiques sont les suivantes : être employé dans le domaine de l'urbanisme, avoir une expérience professionnelle pertinente dans le domaine de l'urbanisme depuis au moins cinq ans et être titulaire d'un diplôme de quatre ans. une fois achevés, ils peuvent permettre à un individu d'accéder rapidement au stade de « candidat » à la profession. Sans diplôme accrédité, une expérience professionnelle pertinente supplémentaire dans la profession d'urbaniste est nécessaire avant qu'une personne puisse se qualifier en tant que candidat.

Comment choisir une école?

Faire le pas de s'inscrire dans une école d'urbanisme est une démarche importante et, en fin de compte, il faut que cela corresponde à ce que l'on recherche. Bien qu'un programme d'études de base soit offert, toutes les écoles proposent des cours et des possibilités d'apprentissage uniques, tels que des stages coopératifs et des options relatives à la langue d'enseignement des programmes (français et anglais). Les programmes d'urbanisme accrédités ne sont également dispensés qu'en personne; vous devrez donc tenir compte de votre lieu de résidence au moment de faire votre choix. Si vous le pouvez, nous vous recommandons de visiter le campus, de parler aux étudiants actuels et aux diplômés des programmes qui vous intéressent.

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CONTINUOUS PROFESSIONAL LEARNING: Professional Planner's Responsibility

What differentiates a professional planner from an unregistered planner? There are many components, but one of the most notable is the requirement for all professionals to complete annual continuous professional learning (with the exception of Quebec, which has a two-year cycle).

Professional planners must complete a minimum number of learning units, helping to ensure they remain current with their practice and professional competencies. This is a regulated requirement, and as such, the Provincial and Territorial Institutes and Associations (PTIAs) are responsible for the oversight and monitoring of their respective members. It's serious business too, consequences for not meeting the CPL requirements can result in financial penalties and even the loss of an individual's professional designation.

The good news is that with abundant learning opportunities offered in person and online – synchronously and asynchronously –

it has never been easier to meet the profession's CPL requirements. Already, CIP provides member access to the CPL HUB – a free repository of all our recorded webinars and conference sessions – and we also have the national events calendar on our website with CIP and PTIA event listings (www.cip-icu.ca/events-calendar). Our CIP Planning Schools & Educational Guide further highlights the many programs and courses available from our educational partners, happy reading!

NEW: Did you know that you don't have to be a professional planner to keep a record of continuous professional learning? 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FORMATION PROFESSIONNELLE CONTINUE : la responsabilité d'un urbaniste professionnel

Qu'est-ce qui différencie un urbaniste professionnel d'un urbaniste non agréé? Il existe de nombreux éléments, mais l'un des plus notables est l'obligation pour tous les professionnels de suivre une formation professionnelle continue annuelle (à l'exception du Québec, qui dispose d'un cycle de deux ans).

Les urbanistes professionnels doivent suivre un nombre minimum d'unités d'apprentissage, ce qui leur permet de rester au fait de leur pratique et de leurs compétences professionnelles. Il s'agit d'une exigence réglementée et, à ce titre, les instituts et associations provinciaux et territoriaux (IAPT) sont responsables de la supervision et du suivi de leurs membres respectifs. Il s'agit également d'une affaire sérieuse, les conséquences du non-respect des exigences de la FPC pouvant entraîner des pénalités financières et même la perte du titre professionnel d'un individu.

La bonne nouvelle, c'est qu'avec les nombreuses possibilités d'apprentissage offertes en personne et en ligne, de façon synchrone et asynchrone, il n'a jamais été aussi facile de satisfaire

aux exigences de la profession en matière de FPC. L'ICU offre déjà à ses membres l'accès au Centre d'information sur le permis d'urbaniste (Carrefour de formation continue), un répertoire gratuit de tous nos webinaires et conférences enregistrés, et nous avons également un calendrier d'événements nationaux sur notre site Web avec des listes d'événements de l'ICU et des IAPT. Notre Guide des écoles d'urbanisme de l'ICU met en lumière les nombreux programmes et cours proposés par nos partenaires éducatifs.

NOUVEAU : saviez-vous qu'il n'est pas nécessaire d'être un urbaniste professionnel pour tenir un registre de formation professionnelle continue? Tous les membres de l'ICU et d'un IAPT peuvent désormais enregistrer leurs activités de formation par le biais de la base de données nationale des membres, ce qui constitue un excellent moyen de suivre vos cours et vos réalisations en matière de formation. 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Scholarships and Bursaries for Planning Students

School is expensive! As a fairly recent graduate, I know first-hand the strain that tuition and living expenses can put on personal finances. For students in accredited planning programs, there are a growing number of financial awards to help:

- The CIP/ICU Planning Student Trust Fund provides four scholarships and seven bursaries, plus recipients also get their registration and travel expenses covered to attend the CIP national planning conference cip-pstf.ca
- The College of Fellows Indigenous Planning Student Award grants two Indigenous planning students \$5,000 per year. Visit indspire.ca/cof to learn more.
- Most Provincial and Territorial Institutes and Associations (PTIAs) in Canada have awards for planning students, which should be on your radar. Visit cip-icu.ca/professional-territorial-institutes-associations-ptias.
- Some schools and planning programs even have their own student scholarships and bursaries that shouldn't be overlooked. From my position at CIP, I can say that many student awards receive a relatively low number of applications, so make the time to apply and you never know what may await you!

Bourses d'études et de subsistance pour les étudiants en urbanisme

L'école coûte cher! En tant que jeune diplômée, je sais de première main à quel point les frais de scolarité et les frais de subsistance peuvent peser sur les finances personnelles. Pour les étudiants inscrits à des programmes d'urbanisme agréés, il existe un nombre croissant d'aides financières :

- Le fonds en fidéicomis pour étudiants en urbanisme et aménagement de l'ICU (FFEUA-ICU) offre four bourses d'études et seven bourses de subsistance. De plus, les bénéficiaires voient leurs frais d'inscription et de déplacement couverts pour assister à la conférence nationale de l'urbanisme de l'ICU.
- Le Prix étudiant en planification autochtone du collège des boursiers accorde à deux étudiants autochtones en planification 5 000 \$ par année. Visiter indspire.ca/cof.
- La plupart des instituts et associations provinciaux et territoriaux (IAPT) du Canada décernent des prix aux étudiants en urbanisme, ce qui devrait vous intéresser.
- Certaines écoles et certains programmes d'urbanisme disposent même de leurs propres bourses d'études, qu'il ne faut pas négliger.

En raison de ma position à l'ICU, je peux dire que de nombreuses bourses d'études reçoivent un nombre relativement faible de candidatures, alors prenez le temps de postuler et vous serez peut-être surpris du résultat!

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SNAPSHOT:

2023 Employment Trends and Data for Canadian Planners

It would be an understatement to say that the world has changed over the last four years. This has been particularly evident in the realm of employment and labour, especially considering factors relating to inflation, remote work opportunities, and generational shifts (e.g. Baby Boomers leaving the workforce and Millennials moving into more senior roles). Therefore, with the release of the *2023 Canadian Professional Planners National Employment Survey Report*, it is not a surprise to see shifts in the planning profession since our inaugural report in 2019.

The national, provincial, and territorial planning institutes and associations conducted the compensation and benefits survey from September 6 to October 16 and had 1,727 respondents, which represents 19% of regulated members of the Provincial and Territorial Institutes and Associations (PTIAs).

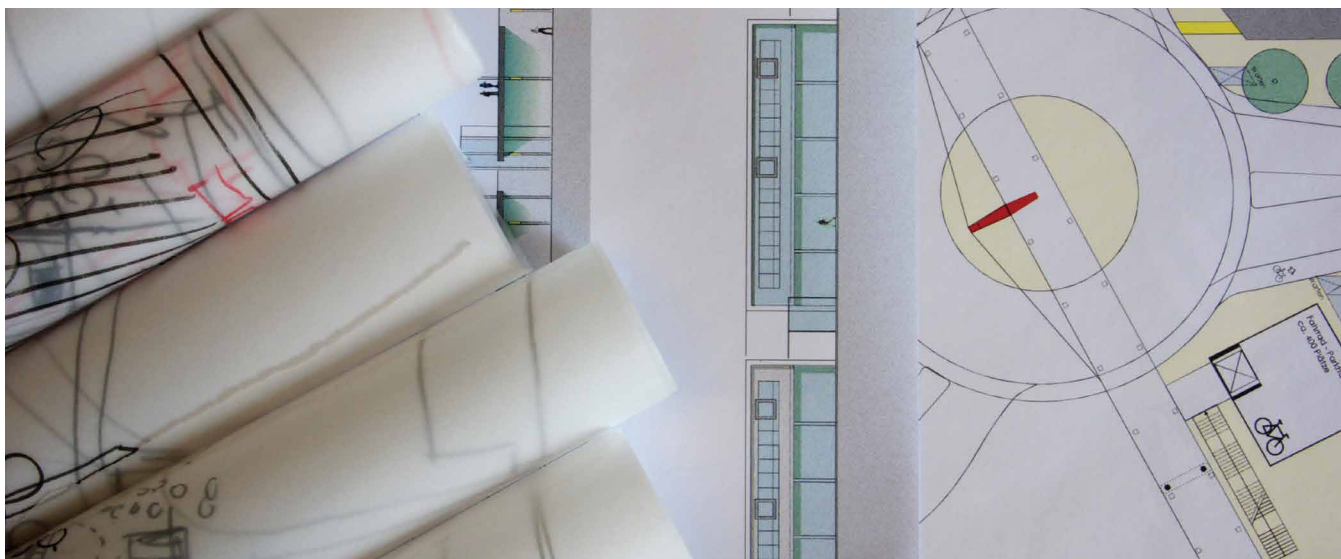
And the results leave us with a lot to think about. Perhaps the most notable finding of the 2023 survey was the 18% average increase in base salaries for professional planners* to \$119,596, up from \$101,562 in 2019. Candidates** saw even larger gains with a 21% increase, from \$70,227 to \$85,223.

New questions were also asked relating to the impact of the pandemic, which uncovered a finding that over 60% of planners enjoy a hybrid work environment and that only 30% remain fully in-office/onsite. Interestingly, the latter group also enjoyed slightly higher wages, as compared to their counterparts in hybrid and fully remote work settings.

Once again, we were very pleased to see that nearly 90% of the survey respondents reported that they were “Very Satisfied” or “Satisfied” with their job overall, which is consistent with our 2019 report.

APERÇU :

Tendances et données de l'emploi pour les urbanistes canadiens de 2023

Ce serait un euphémisme de dire que le monde a changé au cours des quatre dernières années. Cela a été particulièrement évident dans le domaine de l'emploi et du travail, surtout si l'on tient compte des facteurs liés à l'inflation, aux possibilités de travail à distance et aux changements générationnels (par exemple, les baby-boomers qui quittent le marché du travail et les millénariaux qui accèdent à des postes plus élevés). Par conséquent, avec la publication du *Enquête nationale sur l'emploi des urbanistes professionnels canadiens 2023*. Il n'est pas surprenant de constater des changements dans la profession d'urbaniste depuis notre rapport inaugural en 2019.

Les instituts et associations d'urbanistes nationaux, provinciaux et territoriaux ont mené l'enquête sur la rémunération et les avantages sociaux du 6 septembre au 16 octobre. 1 727 personnes ont répondu à l'enquête, ce qui représente 19 % des membres réglementés des instituts et associations provinciaux et territoriaux (IAPT).

Et les résultats nous donnent matière à réflexion. Le résultat le plus remarquable de l'enquête de 2023 est sans doute l'augmentation moyenne de 18 % des salaires de base des urbanistes professionnels*, qui atteignent 119 596 \$, contre 101 562 \$ en 2019. Les candidats** ont connu des gains encore plus importants avec une augmentation de 21 %, passant de 70 227 \$ à 85 223 \$.

De nouvelles questions ont également été posées concernant l'impact de la pandémie, ce qui a permis de découvrir que plus de 60 % des urbanistes se trouvent dans un environnement de travail hybride et que seuls 30 % d'entre eux restent entièrement dans leur bureau/sur place. Il est intéressant de noter que ce dernier groupe jouit également de salaires légèrement plus élevés que leurs homologues travaillant dans des environnements hybrides ou entièrement à distance.

Une fois de plus, nous avons été très heureux de constater que près de 90 % des répondants à l'enquête se sont déclarés « très satisfaits » ou « satisfaits » de leur emploi en général, ce qui est conforme à notre rapport de 2019.

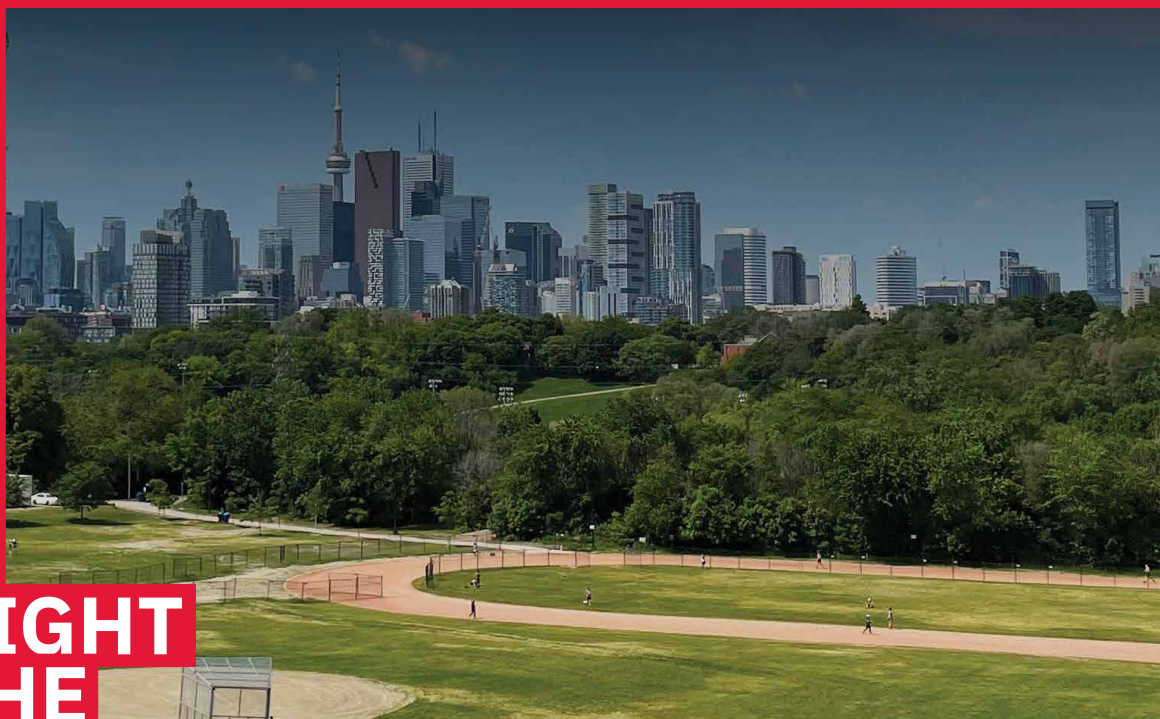

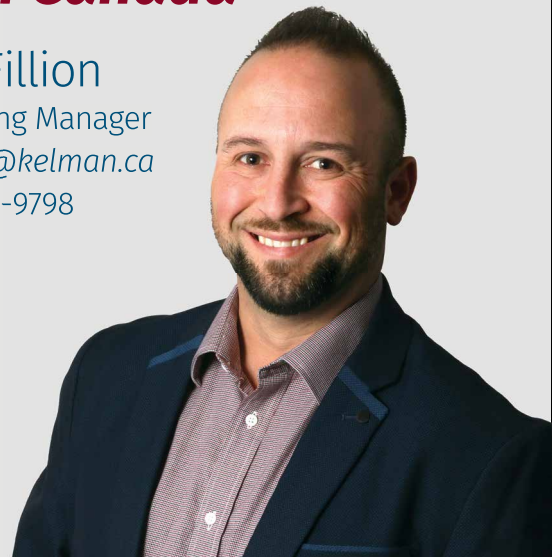
