

Share your story

Grades K-8

Grades 9-12

Story format:

"When I was young, I loved walking to the corner store to get popsicles with my grandmother ... "

Growing up, I was really aware that it just wasn't safe to walk or hike to school"

You can be more detailed about your career path, challenges, and what keeps you motivated: "I realized I wanted to be a planner when my town put in a new park and didn't put in anything for teenagers..."

Keep it visual, conversational and fun. Include projects and pictures. Encourage questions.

Planning is a great career!

Grades K-5 Ask: "Do you like to build things? Ask: "Do you like working with Help people? Imagine new others? Do you want to improve you can make your city greener, ideas?" your neighborhood?" more fair, or easier to get around?"


If the answer is yes, then you should consider planning as a career path!

How to get started

4. How to get started

Grades K-5	Grades 6-8	<u>Grades 9-12</u>
"Why is the bus stop designed like this?" "Why is there a crosswalk here?" Question everything!	"What are your interests?", "What do you excel at?" "What do you do enjoy doing outside of school?"	Talk about planning degrees, accredited programs, and possible paths (direct entry, urban studies, etc.).
Focus on inspiration!	Generate thoughts on career aspirations	Mention RPP in high-level terms: "It's like a professional license for planners"



Tips for success

- Communicate with teachers ahead of time
 - Research projects in the nearby community as examples of relevant projects
- Supplement words with visuals
 - Prepare discussion/activity prompts
 - Provide opportunities for questions throughout

Encourage students to look for opportunities in their communities and school to get involved.
